## September weather

High pressure influenced the UK's weather for the first half of September, bringing fine, sunny, dry conditions and the most significant spell of warmth since June. From the 4th to the 10th, the UK experienced a significant heatwave with temperatures reaching 30°C somewhere in the UK for seven consecutive days: a September record.

Temperatures in England reached 32°C on the 6th, 7th, 9th and 10th, and 33.5°C at Faversham (Kent) on the 10th, making this the hottest day of the year. This has only occurred in September on four previous occasions in 2016, 1954, 1949 and 1919. On the 8th, 28.0°C at Castleberg (County Tyrone) set a new Northern Ireland September record.

However, the heat brought several outbreaks of thunderstorms and intense downpours with rainfall rates of 20 to 30mm per hour, with impacts from flash-flooding.

The second half of the month saw an abrupt change to much more unsettled and autumnal weather with westerly weather bringing Atlantic low pressure systems and significant rain. There were some very wet and windy days, notably storm Agnes from the 27th to the 28th, although fortunately the storm was weakened by the time it reached the UK.

Maximum and minimum temperatures for the month overall were well above average, particularly across the southern half of the UK, with maximum temperature anomalies in some parts of the south-east 3.5 to 4°C above average. The UK monthly mean temperature was 15.2°C, 2.2°C above the 1991-2020 average making this the UK's equal-warmest September in the series from 1884 (shared with 2006). For England and Wales this was the warmest September on record.

The rainfall pattern was variable but rather wet overall with 131% for the UK. Some locations experiencing torrential downpours were particularly wet, for example parts of south and east Devon. Sunshine totals were slightly above average for the UK with 123%.

The monthly extremes were as follows: A maximum temperature of 33.5°C was recorded at Faversham (Kent) on the 10th, the UK's highest temperature of 2023. A minimum temperature of -3.5°C was recorded at Kinbrace (Sutherland) on the 13th.

In the 24 hours ended at 0900 UTC on the 20th, 117.0 mm of rain fell at Honister Pass (Cumbria). A wind gust of 73 knots (84 mph) was recorded at Capel Curig (Conwy) on the 27th.

## FIVE RESCUED FROM FLOODED MINE.

## NINE DAYS ENTOMBED.

On the morning of the tenth day since the flooding of Redding Pit, at Falkirk, five of the forty-two entombed miners have been rescued. The people of the stricken district, whose mood last night was sullen and impatient, following upon unpleasant scenes at the pit-head, were overjoyed by the great news which was made known shortly after three o'clock this morning. Late this afternoon another development was rumoured, and the excitement was renewed. This was a statement to the effect that three men were believed to be alive in No. 2 section, upon which the rescue brigades were concentrating their attention. The officials are reported to be optimistic, and have got a new boring machine in operation, capable of cutting at the rate of six feet of coal per minute. Developments are expected, but it is pointed out that some time may elapse before the men can be reached. In view of the condition of the five men rescued to-day, it is believed to be possible that other men may yet manage to exist for a few days longer.

The recovery of the five men from the pit after their long imprisonment, and when hope had practically been abandoned, astounded the public. It was in the grey hours of the morning that the rescues were effected, and apart from those engaged in the actual work there were few people present at the Gutter Hole shaft when the procession of stretchers carrying the rescued men passed across the potato field to the small mission hall which stands at the edge of it. The news soon spread abroad, and when dawn was breaking there were already groups gathering around the pit shaft in order to confirm a report which seemed almost too good to be true. In view of the impatience shown by the miners of the district last night, the police on duty allowed no one in the field adjoining the pit shaft, and the groups foregathered in the lane alongside. The names of the five rescued men are: JOHN DONALDSON, Forth view, Reddingmuirhead; JAMES JACK, Canal-road, Redding; JOHN MILLER, 25, Glebe-street, Falkirk; ROBERT URE, Wallacetown; ANDREW THOMSON, King-street, Reddingmuirhead.

With the exception of Ure, who appeared to be somewhat ill, all were cheerful, and their first request was for cigarettes. The party was kept underground for some time after rescue, and artificial respiration was applied in order that the men might not be affected by their being brought too suddenly into the night air after their long imprisonment in the pit.

## BEARD AS "TIME RECORDER."

Mr. K. H. McNeill, a Fife colliery agent, who has been in charge of the operations, has provided an official statement of the rescue. He explained how the rescue party had assured themselves that there was tapping going on near the point they had reached. They tapped in response, and worked with a will to bore through. Then they heard distinct shouting, and they gladly responded with shouts. The work became feverish, and eventually resulted in the driving of a hole. To their great delight they were then in direct speaking communication with one or more survivors—how many they did not know.

"How many are there of you?" was their first eager question. The reply came: "Five."

"Who is there?" was the next. The reply was: "Andrew Thomson," and the tone of the voice was exceedingly reassuring, and indicated the buoyant spirits of the men.

"How are you all?" Prompt came the answer: "All!"

Immediately the rescue workers set themselves to enlarge the hole in order to get access to the men and get them through and up to the fresh air. This occupied but a short time, and there followed a scene which it is difficult to describe, as rescuers and entombed men rushed towards one another and shook hands amid general rejoicing. Since the five men had been in darkness for such a period they had naturally lost all sense of time, and one of the first questions after they had exchanged greetings with the rescue party was: "How many days have we been in the pit?"

When they were told that they had been nine days down, and that this was the beginning of the tenth, they seemed greatly astonished and one of them jocularly remarked that he had been trying to keep a tally of the time by the amount of growth on his face. By this test he had concluded this was Sunday.

## Corsican conqueror

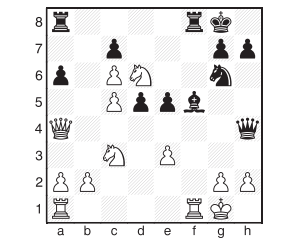

FRENCH GM Marc'Andria Maurizzi, 16, sprang a small surprise, as he won the World Junior (U-20) in Mexico City. The Corsican was the fourth seed and scored 8.5/11 with a superior tie-break to fellow grandmasters Russian Arseniy Nesterov, Luka Budisavljevic of Serbia and Armenia's Mamikon Gharibyan. Hans Niemann was top seed but, possibly distracted by initially also playing online in the AI Cup before going round, lost to 13-year-old fellow American Andy Woodward, as well as to Nesterov in the final round, as he finished a point behind the leaders.

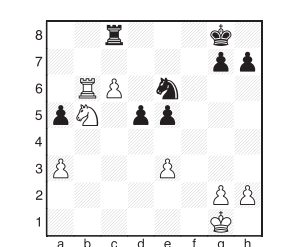
Londoner Shreyas Rayal, 14, started well and gained plenty of experience before finishing on 6.5/11. Shreyas may still be eligible for the competition in 2023. The World Girls Championship was won by WGM Candelaria Francisco, who earlier this year triumphed in the American Continental Women's Championship. The 17-year-old Argentine edged out on tie-break top seed American IM Carissa Yip, as well as Bulgarian WGM Beloslava Krasteva after all three had also finished on 8.5/11.
